

An Opportunity for Our Club

For many years, we have supported the Penny Pines program of the California Garden Club (GGCI) with our donation going to restoration in Cleveland National Forest. Over the past year, there have been a few glitches having our donation checks cashed in a timely manner. The California Garden Club has reached out to clubs to assure them that there has been communication between the Forest Service and CGCI to rectify this situation.

At the same time, we have been made aware of the devastation of our local oak trees due an infestation of the Gold Spotted Oak Borer (GSOB). We are attaching an article regarding this problem. Please take a few minutes to read this article and intorduce yourself to this area of need. The Board of Directors believe that this is a cause that is important, timely, and is our local area. We will be presenting to membership the idea of using our Penny Pines monies to address this beetle infestation and the death of our local oaks







Oaks, the majestic trees found throughout Southern California coasts and hillsides, are known to be durable, strong and enduring. Oak is used for furniture, barrels for wine and liqueurs, and professional drums. It was the wood of choice to build the strongest and fastest pirate ships! Some oaks are estimated to be 1,500 years: those in our area are anywhere from 150 – 400 years old.

Oaks have been credited to be the backbone on the earth: their strong roots deeply penetrate the earth and anchors them firmly into place. Their tall trucks branch into a canopy of leaves, providing shelter, shade, and protection to those beneath it.

For centuries, acorn has been a source of protein for nearby inhabitants. Additionally, oak trees provide food and shelter for thousands of insects, birds and animals. Historically, our Southern California hillsides had been covered with the majestic stature of the oaks. Clearing of the trees has occurred in order to create greater areas for cattle and the needs of urbanization. Fires are another cause of losing oaks. As a result of these threats, in California, our oaks have a protected status. An oak tree cannot be removed from private property unless permitted. These permits are issued by cities and counties.

We honor the importance of the oak to our culture in California and its role in the environment, yet the threat continues. Our precious oaks are being taken down by a bullet shaped beetle that is about .75 inches long. The Goldspotted Oak Borer (GSOB) can be found in the Coast Live Oak, the Canyon Live Oak, and the California Black Oak. The GSOB traveled from Arizona to San Diego and has made its way north to Orange County by being transported in firewood. "Buy It Where You Burn It" is the important mantra for citizens to heed!

Earthrootsfieldschools.org is the steward of 39-acre property in Big Oak Canyon in Silverado Canyon and is facing the same challenge as the Cleveland National Forest to control this infestation of GSOB. Because the mortality rate of infected oak grove is this area is 60 – 90 %, this nonprofit organization needs to extend their emergency fund immediately and leverage volunteers to take action.
